

## REPORTING SEXUAL ASSAULT

### ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY

Active duty military that experience sexual assault have two reporting options:

#### Restricted reporting

Restricted reporting allows an active duty military person who is a sexual assault victim, on a confidential basis, to disclose the details of his/her assault to specifically identified individuals and receive medical treatment and counseling, without triggering the official investigative process. Soldiers who are sexually assaulted and desire restricted reporting under this policy should report the assault to the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC), Victim Advocate, chaplain or a healthcare provider. If victim consents, the SARC will assign a Victim Advocate.

#### Unrestricted reporting

Unrestricted reporting allows a Soldier who is sexually assaulted and desires medical treatment, counseling, and an official investigation of his/her allegation to use current reporting channels (e.g., chain of command, law enforcement, or he/she may report the incident to the SARC or the on-call victim advocate). Upon notification of a reported sexual assault, the SARC will immediately notify a Victim Advocate. Additionally, with the victim's consent, the healthcare provider shall conduct a medical exam and/or forensic examination, which may include the collection of evidence. Details regarding the incident will be limited to only those personnel who have a legitimate need to know.

## WHAT IS SEXUAL ASSAULT

Sexual assault is defined as intentional sexual contact, characterized by use of force, physical threat or abuse of authority or when the victim does not or cannot consent

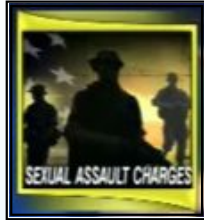
Sexual assault is a crime

Rape

Nonconsensual sodomy

Indecent assault

Attempts to commit above acts



## ARMY POLICY ON SEXUAL ASSAULT

- **SAPRP** is a command program
- Sexual assault is incompatible with Army Values and the Warrior Ethos
- Sexual assault impacts mission readiness
- Sexual assault decreases the Army's ability to work effectively as a team
- Prevention of sexual assault will include training, education and awareness
- All victims will be assisted with dignity, fairness and respect
- Confidential reporting is provided
- Caring and sensitive victim advocate services are available
- Provision of medical and emotional care
- Sexual assault is a criminal offense and addressed under UCMJ, local and federal laws
- Ensure accountability of offenders
- Investigate unrestricted incidents

## WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE SEXUALLY ASSAULTED

- Do your best to become free from the attacker and proceed to a safe place
- Do not shower or clean out wounds
- Do not use bathroom before obtaining medical attention
- Do not brush teeth, comb hair, eat or drink anything before going to the hospital
- Do not remove the clothes that you were wearing when assaulted
- Report directly to the hospital to seek medical attention
- Request that a Victim Advocate be contacted **(702-4953)**
- Recording details is an important action following an assault



## SEXUAL ASSAULT VICTIMS HAVE THE RIGHT TO:

- Be treated with fairness and respect for one's dignity and privacy
- Be reasonably protected from the accused
- Be notified of court hearings
- Be present at public court hearings unless the court determines otherwise for fairness or other good cause
- Receive information regarding conviction, sentencing, imprisonment, and release
- Confer with an attorney for Government Restitution, if appropriate

## PREVENTION

- Be prepared, be alert
- Trust your instincts
- If you feel unsafe, go to a safe place
- Travel with a friend
- Stay in groups
- Avoid situations that make you feel uncomfortable
- Be conscious of your alcohol intake
- Never leave a drink unattended
- Walk only in lighted areas
- Keep doors in homes, barracks, and cars locked
- Be aware of locations for nearest telephones
- Do not go anywhere alone with someone you do not know
- Be assertive, "NO" means "NO."
- Be confident, say what you mean
- If you feel you are in danger, attract attention as soon as possible

## SOME RED FLAGS

*You should be especially alert if the person you are with:*

- Demonstrates behavior that fails to respect you as an individual
- Ignores, interrupts or makes fun of you
- Sits or stands too close or stares at you
- Has a reputation for being a "player"
- Encourages you to drink too much or use drugs
- Touches you when you barely know them
- Pressures you to be alone with them
- Sulks when they don't get their way
- Pressures you to have sex or feel guilty if you say NO
